An active family, they enjoy going to the park, camping, hiking, and spending every moment outdoors – when the weather permits. But putting enough healthy food on the table for four growing children is a challenge for Christina who is disabled and has to make ends meet on a limited fixed income.

During the school year, she knows the children will receive good, nutritious meals at school, and the two youngest receive West Texas Food Bank Food 2 Kids bags that they take home on the weekends. But during summer break, Christina's limited budget can only stretch so far.

Our local food pantry partner, Hope for the Homeless, helps fill the gap for this family and makes it possible for Christina to make the chicken, enchiladas, tacos, beans, and rice that are the children's favorites.

On behalf of families who are facing many difficulties but are receiving the help they need now, Christina thanks you. "I am very grateful," she says. "If it was not for you, I would not be able to put food on the table."
