# A RESOURCE FOR UTPB STUDENTS FACING HUNGER

Jashon has a lot on his plate these days. His goal of graduating from the University of Texas Permian Basin (UTPB) with a degree in Marketing is within reach.

But his father is unwell which weighs heavily on Jashon who is a seven-hour drive away from home.

"I've been having a hard semester because my dad has been battling through cancer," he says. "So, I don't really have that extra support that I used to."

Trying to find a balance between work and scholarships so he can do well in his studies sometimes leaves Jashon with little money left for groceries. Thankfully a resource exists for students who are experiencing food insecurity and it's right there on the UTPB campus...

The UTPB Student Pantry provides groceries and snacks for Jashon during lean times and the food lasts him up to three weeks. "College is hard, so it is nice to have that extra support with food insecurity."

## WTFB GRAND OPENING OF THE ODESSA EXPANSION

The West Texas Food Bank recently marked an important milestone in its mission to fight hunger in our communities with the grand opening of the Odessa Expansion.

Over 250 community members gathered to celebrate the occasion. Special guest speaker Claire Babineaux-Fontenot, CEO of Feeding America, gave an impassioned address highlighting the importance of community-driven initiatives like the West Texas Food Bank to ensure that no

This innovative space enhances the Food Bank but also serves a practical purpose in promoting educational opportunities for the community to learn more about where food comes from.

With this expansion, and with support from caring friends and donors, the Food Bank is better equipped to meet the evolving needs of the community.



The financial strain has made it a challenge to put food on the table. But thanks to our Food 2 Kids program, Erika's children have access to essential kid-friendly meals and snacks — including mac and cheese, their favorite.
